Promoting British Values at St Michael and All Angels Catholic Primary School

The DfE (Department for Education) have reinforced the need "to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

As a Catholic school we follow the example of Jesus and this is at the heart of all that we do. We actively promote values, virtues and ethics that shape our pupils' character and moral perspective, through the teachings of the church. We are confident that our continued focus on the Gospel values will support our pupils in their awareness of what it means to be a good citizen in Britain today and embed in them the building blocks of a future successful and productive life.

The government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy. At St Michael and All Angels Catholic Primary school these values are reinforced regularly and in the following ways:
