- The UK is made up of four countries: England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

Vocabulary

Country	A country is land that is controlled by a single government.	Mountain	Land that which is 'higher and steeper than a hill'.
City	A city is a place where many people live closely together.	Nation	A nation is a group of people who share the same culture, history, language or ethnicity.
Continent	A very large land mass that consists of many countries Europe is a continent.	Ocean	An ocean is a huge body of salt water.
Countryside	Rural areas are areas which are not towns or cities. They are often farming or agricultural areas.	Peak	The pointed top of a mountain.
Island	Land area surrounded entirely by water .	Sea	The expanse of salt water that covers most of the earth's surface and surrounds its land masses.
Monument	a structure (as a building, stone, or statue) made to keep alive the memory of a person or event.	Village	a small town or community, often in the country.
