## Key information

When creating landscape scenery, it can be sketched on location rather than from photographs, leading to a more personal image.

Colours can be used to create the overall mood of the painting: eg, if it has been raining, dull, dreary colours such as greys can be used. If it is bright and sunny, warmer, happier colours, such as yellow and orange can be used.
